Week of June 18, 2023 The Eleventh Sunday in Ordinary Time

Did you know that the more you watch or listen to the news the more pessimistic you tend to become? My experience in the confessional verifies this. It's not necessarily a long-lasting condition, but it can return quickly by way of almost any conversation that gets past the weather.

Psychologist Jennifer James offers a strategy for keeping things in perspective. She writes: *"To reduce stress, simply turn off your TV, radio, cell phone, smart watch or whatever device you use, and go easy on the news websites and magazines... You don't have to tune out forever, just take a rest. Anxiety, even if it is the manufactured kind, can make us very cranky."*

I think the doctor makes a good point. I happen to know a priestly confrere who told me he once committed himself to avoid the news for 2 years! He said that he reached his goal a while ago. I believe his story, even if I could never imitate his solution. I do like to know the news and cultural trends so as to apply the Gospel to them in homilies.

No one, including myself, is suggesting that you shouldn't stay well-informed. But at the same time, it is so easy to overdo anything in life, even something that's a basic good.

Note a detail in today's First Reading, where we read that Yahweh commissioned Moses with a message. Fast forward to the New Testament, and we come to today's Gospel passage. Our Lord commissioned His chosen Twelve to announce the Good News. What was that? The kingdom of God is near at hand. News that was necessary. Information of the highest value. It still deserves our undivided attention.

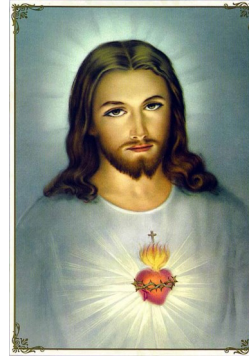
Our present world and its topsy-turvy culture is a challenging place to live in as a Christian. Same for anyone of good will who respects law and order and a person's right to live in peace. Nonetheless, Jesus tells us we all have a mission to address that culture with our own. We can make this world better because Jesus is with us all days. If our numbers bother you, just look what Jesus did with only Twelve!

I want to give a nod here to Father's Day with one relevant and touching story: *A little boy, frightened by a thunderous lightning storm, called out one dark night "Daddy, come. I'm scared!"*

"Son," the father replied, "God loves you and He'll take care of you." "I know God loves me," the boy replied. "But right now, I want somebody who has skin on."

God love you, men, and keep up the good work of giving God "skin."

The Nativity of Saint John the Baptist June 24

The Gospel of Luke begins with the story of the Angel Gabriel's visit to a priest named Zechariah. He announced that his wife, Elizabeth, would bear a child, though she was elderly and barren. This child, John, would be filled with the Holy Spirit and play a significant role in God's plan of redemption.

Only three birthdays are celebrated on the Church's liturgical calendar: the Nativity of Our Lord, the Nativity of His Mother, and the Nativity of His forerunner, Saint John the Baptist. The Church honors him because of his role in preparing the way for Christ.

John challenges us to the fundamental attitude of Christianity—total dependence on the Father, in Christ. Except for Mary, no one had a higher function in the unfolding of salvation. Yet the least in the kingdom, Jesus said, is greater than he, for the pure gift that the Father gives. The austerity of John and his fierce courage in denouncing evil—all stem from his fundamental and total placing of his life within the will of God.
