



The long board meeting is over. A general approval awaits the CEO's decision. The production team is geared up. Right then the CEO turns to her Vice-President for communications and says: "Charlie, get the word out!" With that comes a flood of TV commercials, online ads, signs on buses and trains, not to omit printed comeons for consumers. That scenario is common in the business world: A pattern laid out for the company's positive bottom line.

Our Lord, who by His own admission is the Word, needs to get His message out to the world, needing no more than loving and dedicated disciples like us. He began with His Chosen Twelve and then moved on to the great St. Paul. There followed a long line of preachers and teachers worthy of sainthood, right up to you and me.

The Holy Spirit lets us in on a masterful presentation that Jesus makes through a farming parable all about seeds and sowing. He does it under a smiling sun in the great outdoors, which He seems to prefer to an enclosed academic setting. His rural audience is entranced as He speaks.

In response to His apostles' query, Jesus explains to them (and us) that the various soils represent the kinds of response the Word generates among people. From faithfilled conviction all the way to apathetic yawning.

There is a story of the poet Samuel Coleridge, who one day listened to a visitor's vehement argument against the religious education of the young. His acquaintance had concluded with a statement of his determination not to prejudice his children toward any faith or religion, but to let them make up their own minds when they reached maturity.

Coleridge made no immediate comment, but shortly afterward asked his visitor if he would like to see his garden, and then led him to a strip of lawn that was overgrown with weeds.

"Why, this is no garden. It's nothing but a weed patch, said his guest. "Oh," replied Coleridge, "that's because it hasn't come to maturity yet. The weeds, you see, have taken the opportunity to grow, and I thought it would be unfair of me to prejudice the soil toward roses and strawberries."

The History of Eucharistic Adoration & the Nocturnal Adoration Society



From the beginnings of the Church, the real and physical presence of Jesus Christ in the Eucharist has been asserted. In his letter to the Corinthians, Saint Paul reminds the faithful that the Eucharist is no ordinary food and that it is, in fact, the Body and Blood of Christ according to "the tradition which I handed on to you that came to me from the Lord Himself" (I Corinthians II: 23-26).

This belief has been affirmed throughout the centuries. The Vatican Council II taught that the Holy Eucharist is "the source and summit of the Christian life" ("Lumen Gentium," No. 11). As such, Eucharistic Adoration is an authentic Catholic doctrine and it rests on the unchangeable truth of our revealed faith. Here is a brief history of this reverent practice.

200 AD

Hermits, who could not attend mass regularly, reserved the consecrated Eucharist within their hermitages. The purpose was to give themselves Holy Communion. However, the knowledge that this was, in fact, their Lord and Savior led them to treat it with great reverence.

1000 AD

Monasteries carried on the hermit's tradition of Eucharistic preservation and expanded on it by building special receptacles to keep the Eucharist from being profaned.

) 1264 AD

The first feast of Corpus Christi (*The Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ*) was celebrated, one year after a Eucharistic Miracle in Bolsena affirmed St. Juliana's mystic visions in which Our Lord instructed her to establish a feast for the Holy Eucharist.

) 1539 AD

Pope Paul III approved of the Forty Hour devotion, a new practice consisting of forty hours of continual prayer before the Blessed Sacrament exposed. The 40 Hours Devotion remembers that traditional "forty-hour period" from our Lord's burial until the resurrection.

) 1809 AD

Pope Pius VIII was held prisoner by Napoleon. In response, groups of men came together in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament during the night hours in the churches of Rome, where the Forty Hours devotion was in progress, to pray for the safety of the Pope.

) 1810 AD

The nocturnal practice became so popular that ecclesiastical approval was given to these adorers and in 1810 the Nocturnal Adoration Society came into existence.

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
Reading I: Isaiah 55: 10-11

God's Word comes gently and soaks into the earth only to be drawn back to Him. It is less a message and more an event.

Reading II: Romans 8: 18-23

Through the Spirit the Christian becomes a child of God and destined for glory. All of creation "groans" until we are fully redeemed.

The Gospel: Matthew 13: 1-23, or 13: 1-9 Jesus prefers to teach outdoors rather than in a stuffy academic box. His parable appeals to a rural audience. The four types of soil represent various ways people respond to the Word of God.



St. Mary Magdalene July 22

St. Mary Magdalene is a legendary example of God's mercy and grace. Named the "Apostle of the Apostles" by St. Thomas Aquinas, the dates of her birth and death are unknown, but judging from her name we do know that she hailed from Magdala, a fishing village on the western shore of Lake Tiberias.

Over the years, there has been much debate over her story. Some have posited that she was also the sinner in Luke's gospel who washed Jesus' feet with perfume and her tears. However, there is little evidence to support this.

Despite the scholarly dispute over her background, what she did in her subsequent life, after meeting Jesus, is much more significant. After Jesus cast seven demons from her, she is shown to be a devoted disciple. She was one of few who bravely stood at the foot of the cross, when so many others fled in fear. Her faithfulness was later rewarded when she became the "prima testis" or the first witness of Jesus' Resurrection. Despite a flawed beginning, Mary reorients her life towards God and becomes one of the greatest saints of the Bible. Mary's story gives us an example of how no person is beyond the saving grace of God.

God, it was to St. Mary Magdalene before all others that Your Son committed the message of Easter joy. Through her intercession may we one day contemplate Him reigning in glory. Amen.
