Week of July 9, 2023 The Fourteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time



Now that the excitement of the Fourth has passed, we can rightly settle down to the "lazy, hazy crazy days of summer." Whether that means stretching out over the sands of the beach (dermatologist's warning intact about skin protection), or lounging by a mountain lake, or even a long-anticipated trip to a faraway place, there should always be a place for learning.

The higher temperatures of summer almost compel us to slow down, so they provide the pace for learning. Free of any classroom pressure, our minds can relax to "drink in" the truths of life along with our glass of iced tea. So it is with the message provided by this weekend's Gospel passage.

First Jesus asks us to number ourselves among the "little ones." By that He means those willing to douse the fires of pride that may ride along our thought patterns because we have attained this or that academic degree; or found success in the material world, or even a happy blending within of our vocational choice and our given nature. Then He tells us that not only is He God's Son, but also that we can be the same through His selection of us.

But the "topper in the topic" is that soothing invitation: "Come to Me, all you who labor and are burdened, and I will give you rest." Note here that we are offered more than a summer vacation's rest can bring. It is that deeper rest that ensues when we take off the heavy backpack of cares and worries that weigh us down in all seasons.

Jesus asks us to take up His easy yoke and learn from Him. The word "easy" is "chrestos" in Greek, which can mean "well fitting." In Palestine, yokes were made of wood; the ox was brought, and the measurements were taken. The yoke was then roughed out, and the ox was brought back to have the yoke tried on. The yoke was carefully adjusted so that it would fit well and not chafe the neck of the patient animal. The yoke was tailor-made to fit the ox. There is a legend that Jesus made the best yokes in all of Galilee. We believe He does the same for us. Ultimately, Jesus is saying to each of us: "The life I give you is not a burden to cause you pain; your task is made to measure to fit you." A summertime lesson to savor and generate thankful praise. Meanwhile, it is also true that "you'll have a better life is you make the most of the best and the least of the worst." (Anon.)

Saint Kateri Tekakwitha July 14

St. Kateri was born in 1656 in a Mohawk village. At age 4 she contracted smallpox, leaving her disfigured and half blind. The scars were a source of humiliation in her youth. Worse, her entire family died during the outbreak and she was subsequently raised by her uncle.

Moved by Jesuit missionaries, she converted to Catholicism at age 19. She was baptized with the name Kateri, after St. Catherine of Siena. This was very unpopular with her people and she was heavily persecuted for it. Despite this, she persevered in her faith.

Fearing for her safety, one of the priests convinced Kateri to leave and take the 200-mile journey on foot to a Christian Native village near Montreal. There, she made a vow of perpetual virginity and grew in faith. According to legend, Kateri was very devout and practiced selfmortifications such as putting thorns on her sleeping mat. She often prayed for the conversion of her fellow Mohawks.

Sadly, just five years after her conversion, she became ill and passed away at age 24. St. Kateri is the first Native American to be recognized as a saint by the Catholic Church. She is associated with outsiders, exiles, orphans, and people ridiculed for their beliefs. She is also patroness of Indigenous people, patroness of ecology and ecologists, and Protector of Canada.
