

February 3 St. Blaise

Despite his popularity, very little is known about this holy man. What we do know is that he was Bishop of Sebaste in Armenia, and that he was martyred under Emperor Licinius in 316 AD. The rest of St. Blaise's story comes from legend and traditions.

It is believed that he was a physician before he became a healer of souls. During the Christian persecution, he was forced to flee into the wilderness where he became a hermit. He continued to minister to God's creatures, healing the sick and wounded wild animals who visited his cave.

One day, hunters seeking animals for the amphitheater found Blaise. They were astounded for he was kneeling in prayer, surrounded by wolves, lions and bears.

The hunters then took him to prison. On the way, they encountered people in need. One story tells of a desperate mother whose son was choking on a fish bone. At Blaise's command, the child coughed up the bone. Another story tells of a woman whose pig was seized by a wolf. Blaise commanded the wolf to return it and the wolf complied. Later, in prison, the woman brought Blaise his trademark candles so that he could read Scripture in the dark cell.

Because of his miracles, he has become known as a saint of healing, particularly maladies of the throat. However, while we invoke St. Blaise for his protection against physical ailments, we should also ask his protection against spiritual ailments- profanity, cursing, unkind remarks, detraction, or gossip. St. James reminds us, "If a man who does not control his tongue imagines that he is devout, he is self-deceived; his worship is pointless" (1:26) and later, "We use [the tongue] to say, 'Praised be the Lord and Father'; then we use it to curse men, though they are made in the likeness of Blessing and curse come out of the same God. mouth. This ought not to be, my brothers!" (3:9-10). Therefore, may St. Blaise protect us from all evil, physical and spiritual, which may attack the throat.

February 4th Blessing of the Throats

The tradition of invoking St. Blaise's intercession for ailments of the throat has been practiced since the 9th century. Next week at the Vigil and Sunday masses we will perform a blessing of the throats in honor of St. Blaise. We will not do individual blessings, but a prayer of blessing will be said over the whole assembly.



Even if you must endure loud movie trailers to learn it, all of the so-called "Superheroes" in the movie world use flash and bang against their enemies. This comes after all the spoken warnings to behave better are ignored. So, we see bolts of lightning and hear ear-piercing noise as the evil figures are either vaporized or otherwise dismissed from the scene. Of course, we innocent viewers know that all this ammunition lends authority to the "good guys" when they speak. It's that authority I choose to focus on in another context.

Twenty plus centuries ago, we Christians believed that a Person with truly omnipotent ability strode this earth with the name "Jesus of Nazareth." He never exercised His power in a noisy burst of electricity. Instead, as when He calmed the raging sea in a wicked storm, or when He gave an evil spirit the order to leave a possessed person, He simply spoke a simple command. Naturally His voice would be raised over the roiling waters so that the frightened fishermen in the boat would hear Him. But usually, He used a calm command.

These two examples, among many others recounted in the Bible, were the bases for His authority when He taught. As we are told, He "amazed" everybody. So much so that they asked each other" "What is this? A new teaching with **authority**?

Right at this junction a penetrating question for our confused times arises: "Do we dare question Christ's authority?" "Doubt His teaching on any number of subjects just because they are not fashionable right now?" "Ignore the interpretation given to them by the Church He founded and which He promised to abide by?" Those questions we must ask ourselves because all around us are people whom we might otherwise consider "nice" but who have decided to answer "Yes." Two thousand plus years ago people called "pagans" couldn't or wouldn't agree with Jesus. Today's contemporary atheists make the same response.

It is a good and healthy exercise for our spiritual well-being to reflect on today's Gospel passage to note how quickly evil spirits had to flee in obedience to Christ's command. This is our solace when temptations of all kinds come to haunt us.

Meanwhile, we can add in how Christ works His authoritative message into our world. St. Teresa of Avila gives us the answer:

"Christ has no body on earth but yours; No hands but yours; No feet but yours; Yours are the eyes through which He is to look out Christ's compassion to the world; Yours are the feet with which He is to go about doing good; Yours the hands with which He is to bless now."

God love you and give you His peace.



February 2 The Feast of the Presentation of the Lord

Forty days after Christmas, the Church celebrates the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord, an event that the evangelist Luke recounts in his Gospel. Under the original Mosaic law, the first-born male was considered the Lord's possession and was destined to serve in the temple. However, when the descendants of Levi, the Levites, later assumed this service in the temple, this prescription was no longer enforced. However, the first-born son had to be redeemed with a monetary offering to maintain the priests.

Simeon, a devout and upright man, had been told by the Lord he would meet the Messiah before his death. When Jesus comes to the Temple, we see the fulfillment of this prophecy. Simeon and the prophetess Anna, acting - in the words of Pope John Paul II – as "representatives of the Old Covenant" - recognize Jesus' Lordship as Messiah in this culmination of their watchful waiting. When Simeon receives Jesus, he blesses him, and prophesies Jesus' future as Savior, proclaiming him the Light of the world.

On this day, we also reflect on the gift of consecrated life. While the momentary satisfaction of selfish living ultimately leads to emptiness, living a life of holiness, dedicated to God's service, will give true contentment and peace. As Pope Francis has expressed, "Consecrated life is born and reborn of an encounter with Jesus as he is: poor, chaste and obedient... And while worldly life soon leaves our hands and hearts empty, life in Jesus fills us with peace to the very end, as in the Gospel, where Simeon and Anna come happily to the sunset of their lives with the Lord in their arms and joy in their hearts."


