Week of November 10, 2024 The Thirty-Second Sunday in Ordinary Time



The practice of a jubilee year has ancient roots in the Jewish tradition and evidence for it can be found in the Old Testament (for example, see Leviticus 25). The jubilee year was called every fifty years and was a time for forgiveness. It stood as a reminder of God's providence and mercy. The dedication of a year for this emphasis provided the community with a time to come back into right relationship with one another and with God. As the practice of the jubilee year was adopted into the Catholic Church in 1300, these themes of mercy, forgiveness, and solidarity continued.

2025 is the Church's next Ordinary Jubilee (as opposed to an extraordinary jubilee year, such as 2016's Jubilee of Mercy, which is outside the 25 year cycle). The theme of the upcoming jubilee is Pilgrims of Hope. In his statement announcing the theme, Pope Francis said, "We must fan the flame of hope that has been given us and help everyone to gain new strength and certainty by looking to the future with an open spirit, a trusting heart and far-sighted vision. The forthcoming Jubilee can contribute greatly to restoring a climate of hope and trust as a prelude to the renewal and rebirth that we so urgently desire..."

The Jubilee Year will offer the faithful opportunities to participate in various jubilee events at the Vatican and in their own dioceses. The great tradition of opening the Holy Door will begin when Pope Francis opens the Holy Door of St. Peter's Basilica on December 24, 2024. Other holy doors will be opened at the Rome basilicas of St. John Lateran, St. Mary Major and St. Paul Outside the Walls.



The Holy Door, or the 'Porta Sancta' is the northernmost entrance of St. Peter's Basilica. It is bricked up on the inside and only opened on jubilee years. "In Catholic tradi-

tion, the Holy Door represents the passage to salvation —

the path to a new and eternal life, which was opened to humanity by Jesus," explained Pope Francis in *Spes Non Confundit* (Hope Does Not Disappoint), the papal bull officially proclaiming the Holy Year of 2025.

A quarter of a century earlier, St. John Paul II wrote of the Holy Door in *Incarnationis Mysterium*, his bull of indiction of the Great Jubilee, explaining how it "evokes the passage from sin to grace which every Christian is called to accomplish. Jesus said: 'I am the door' (John 10:7), in order to make it clear that no one can come to the Father except through him. This designation which Jesus applies to himself testifies to the fact that he alone is the Savior sent by the Father. There is only one way that opens wide the entrance into the life of communion with God: this is Jesus, the one and absolute way to salvation. To him alone can the words of the Psalmist be applied in full truth: 'This is the door of the Lord where the just may enter' (Psalm 118:20)."

John Paul II adds that it is the responsibility of every believer to cross the threshold of this "door." Why? "To pass through that door means to confess that Jesus Christ is Lord; it is to strengthen faith in him in order to live the new life which he has given us. It is a decision which presumes freedom to choose and also the courage to leave something behind, in the knowledge that what is gained is divine life (Matthew 13:44-46)."

For the first time in the history of jubilees, Pope Francis will also open a Holy Door in Rome's Rebibbia prison on December 26, the feast day of St. Stephen. The opening of the Holy Door in the Roman prison will be a "symbol of all the prisons scattered around the world," according to Archbishop Rino Fisichella, pro-prefect of the Dicastery for Evangelization. "In the jubilee year we are called to be tangible signs of hope for so many brothers and sisters who live in conditions of hardship."

During the 2025 Jubilee Year of Hope, Pope Francis is calling on governments worldwide to undertake initiatives to restore dignity to prisoners that "go hand in hand with a concrete commitment to respect for the law."

The Holy Father stated, "I propose to the governments that during the jubilee year they take initiatives that restore hope, forms of amnesty or pardon that help people to regain confidence in themselves and in society, ways of reintegration into the community."

For pilgrims who cannot travel to Rome, bishops around the world are expected to designate their cathedrals or a popular Catholic shrine as special places of prayer for Holy Year pilgrims, offering opportunities for reconciliation, indulgences and other events intended to strengthen and revive faith.
