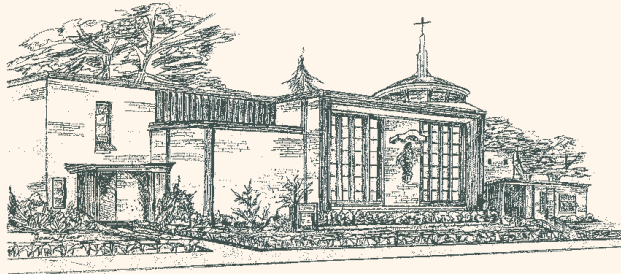

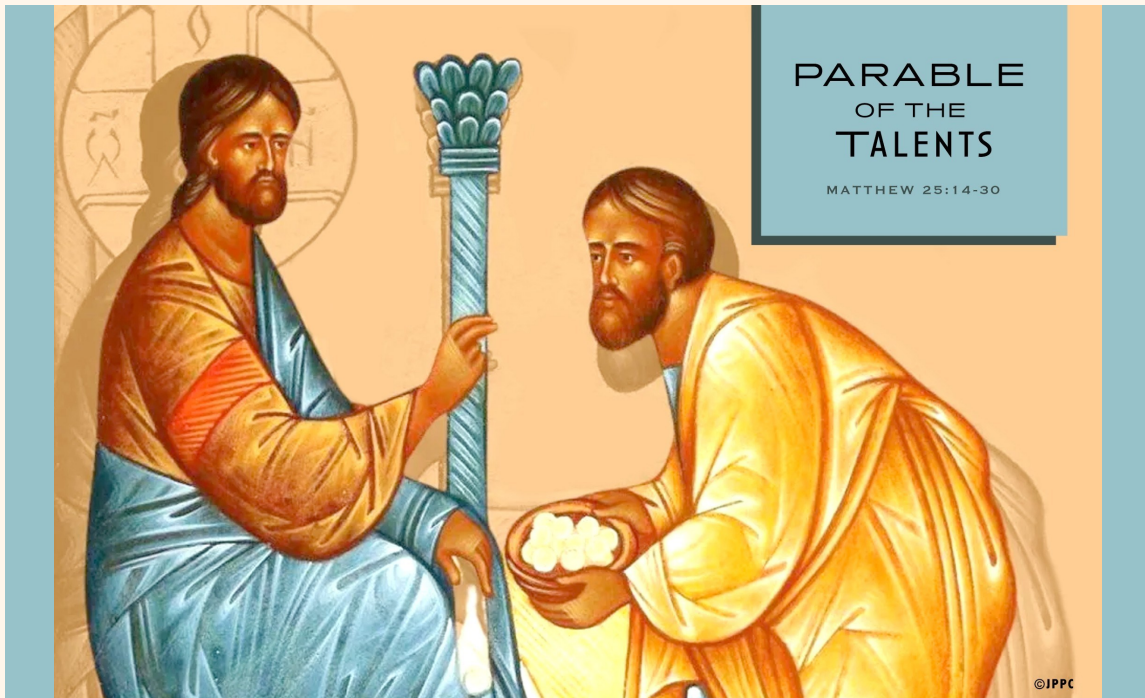

The rectory will be closed Thursday, November 23rd and Friday, November 24th.

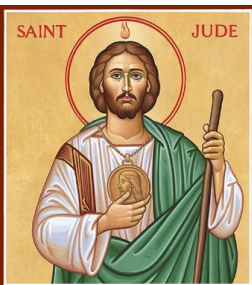


The Giving Tree Project 2023

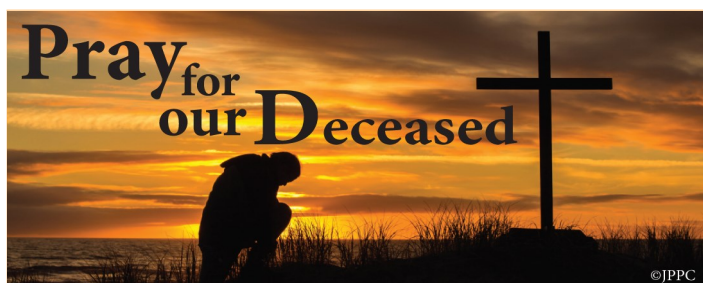

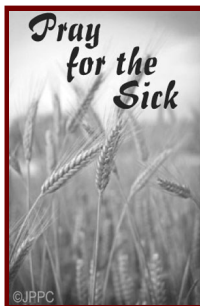

This week's parable has long been called "The Parable of the Talents." Right away we have a language problem because a talent was not a coin, but a weight. Its value depended on the metal involved, be it copper, gold, or silver. Silver being the most common metal at that time. So, the value of a talent of silver was considerable. It was worth about 15 years' wages for a working man. You may remember the wager that the fictional Messala bet against Judah Ben-Hur in the movie of that name was a thousand talents. A veritable fortune.

The useless servant in Christ's story stands for the scribes and Pharisees and their attitude to the law and the truth of God. Their whole attitude was to "build a fence around the law" so that it would remain intact.

Anything new was forbidden, so they "buried their talent," which led to a kind of paralysis of the truth of religion. Hence, their hatred of Jesus for His expansion of the Law of Moses.

Like the man who buried his talent, they wanted to keep things exactly as they had been for years. But Jesus taught that there can be no religion without a touch of freedom and adventure.

The parable stresses that we all have differing talents, in the sense of the word here meaning "gifts." God expects us to use our particular talent or talents, in that spiritual sense, for the glory of God and the good of our neighbor. We are not equal in talent, but we can be equal in our effort. So, each member of the Mystical Body of Christ, the Church, has been gifted.

The parable also teaches that those who are punished are the people who will not try. Here we come upon a truth taught so well by Gilbert Keith Chesterton, who wrote that "Christianity has not been tried and found wanting; it has been found difficult and left untried."

Here in the "vestibule" of our National Day of Thanksgiving, we can be grateful for sure of the talent or talents that God has given us, along with the special freedoms we enjoy in America that permit us to share them, along with our time and treasure, so that the poor among us may always have hope in their hearts also.

St. Andrew Dũng-Lac & Companions November 24

One man, a priest, gives his name to November 24th's feast, but the one stands for many: 117 Vietnamese faithful. They were bishops, priests, and many laypeople, a mother of six and even a nine-year-old child, who gave their lives for Christ between the 17th and the 19th centuries. 96 were native Vietnamese and 21 were Spanish or French missionaries who had embraced that land and culture. The group of 117, canonized together by Pope John Paul II in 1988, in turn stands for a nameless multitude estimated at between 100,000 and 300,000 martyrs, the "great cloud of witnesses" whose blood was the seed of a thriving Church in the land of Vietnam.

Dung An-Tran was born in 1795 to a poor Vietnamese family. They followed the traditional religion of their land, but were converted after moving to Hanoi to look for work. Dung was baptized as Andrew and eventually became an ordained priest.

The rulers of Vietnam practiced Buddhism, Confucianism and ancestor worship. They saw Christianity as an attack upon their culture. Christian persecution was widespread. They were tattooed with the words "ta dao" or "false religion" on their faces. They were stripped of their belongings and their villages were burned down. When arrested, they were told to trample the crucifix and when they would refuse they would be cruelly tortured to death. But the baptized members of the Body of Christ knew the voice of their Shepherd too well to betray Him. What the rulers of the land did to wipe out the Church, the Spirit of God used to give the Church deep and lasting roots. By the end of the 20th century, Catholics were estimated at 10% of the Vietnamese population.

Father Andrew was arrested and then subsequently ransomed by his parishioners twice, before he was arrested, tortured and beheaded in 1839. When he and the 117 named martyrs were canonized in 1988, the communist government of Vietnam did not permit a single representative from that country to attend. But 8,000 Vietnamese Catholics from the diaspora were there, filled with joy to be the children of this suffering Church.
