



The rectory will be closed on Wednesday, January 1st.




Nocturnal Adoration

The Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God is a **Holy Day of Obligation**

We start the new year off with The Solemnity of Mary and World Peace Day. In the encyclical *Marialis Cultus* (1974) Pope Paul VI states: "This celebration, assigned to January 1 in conformity with the ancient liturgy of the city of Rome, is meant to commemorate the part played by Mary in this mystery of salvation. It is meant also to exalt the singular dignity which this mystery brings to the 'holy Mother . . . through whom we were found worthy . . . to receive the Author of life.' It is likewise a fitting occasion for renewed adoration of the newborn Prince of Peace, for listening once more to the glad tidings of the angels, and for imploring from God, through the Queen of Peace, the supreme gift of peace. For this reason . . . we have instituted the World Day of Peace, an observance that is gaining increasing support and is already bringing forth fruits of peace in the hearts of many."

Let us gather together to celebrate Our Holy Mother and to pray that God's peace may reign in our world!



Meet Luce!

The Vatican has unveiled a cartoon mascot for the 2025 Jubilee Year. Luce (pronounced Loo-chey), which means "light" in Italian, was deigned by Simone Legno, the Italian cofounder of the pop culture brand tokidoki.

Her cheerful countenance is filled with thoughtful symbolism. Her muddy boot and walking stick are indicators of her pilgrim status. The rosary around her neck mirrors the colors of the Jubilee logo. The light in her eyes

are shaped like shells, a symbol most commonly associated with the popular pilgrimage of El Camino de Santiago, but more deeply symbolizes perseverance in faith. Finally, her yellow raincoat is meant to symbolize journeying through life's storms. Our faith shields us and keeps us warm and secure when the world around us darkens.

Just like all of us as members of the Church, Luce does not travel alone. She and her diverse group of friends and her trusty dog Santino were debuted at Lucca Comics and Games in Italy. It was the first time that a Vatican dicastery participated in a comics convention.

Archbishop Rino Fisichella, the Vatican's chief organizer for the jubilee, described the mascot as part of the Vatican's goal to engage with "the pop culture so beloved by our young people." He expressed hope that Luce would, "allow us to speak to the younger generations about the theme of hope, which is more central than ever in the evangelical message."

Luce's reveal has sparked a hot debate online. Some see it as a misguided marketing campaign. However, she has drawn the attention of many non-Catholics who are now expressing interest in the faith. Jesus called us to be lights to the world, and no matter where you stand on the debate, Luce undeniable has shone Christ's light into the darkness with her innocent smile. May she be a reminder to all believers that the Lord called us to "turn and become like little children" (Matthew 18:3) to enter the kingdom of Heaven.

A Family Prayer for the New Year

All make the sign of the cross. The leader begins:

Let us praise the Lord of days and seasons and years, saying: Glory to God in the highest!

R/. And peace to his people on earth!

Our lives are made of days and nights, of seasons and years, for we are part of a universe of suns and moons and planets. We mark ends and we make beginnings and, in all, we praise God for the grace and mercy that fill our days.

Then the Scripture is read, either Genesis 1:14-19 or Psalm 90:1-4

Reader: The Word of the Lord. **R/. Thanks be to God.**

After a time of silence, members of the household offer prayers of thanksgiving for the past year, and of intercession for the year to come. On January 1, it may be appropriate to conclude these prayers with the Litany of the Blessed Virgin Mary since this is the solemn feast of Mary, Mother of God.

All join hands for the Lord's Prayer.

Let us now pray for God's blessing in the new year.

After a short silence, parents may place their hands on their children in blessing as the leader says:

Remember us, O God; from age to age be our comforter. You have given us the wonder of time, blessings in days and nights, seasons and years. Bless your children at the turning of the year and fill the months ahead with the bright hope that is ours in the coming of Christ. You are our God, living and reigning, forever and ever. **R/. Amen.**

Let us bless the Lord.

All respond, making the sign of the cross: **Thanks be to God.**

The prayer may conclude with the singing of a Christmas carol.
