





Does your bank advertise itself on TV? If not, it may go to other outlets to make sure you know its ultimate message: "You can trust us." In doing so, the hope is that you will soon open an account with them. In this time of so much thievery going on, either by a masked and hooded thug approaching a victim at gunpoint across a store counter, or by the clever and callous online hacking that uses deceit as a method, pointing out the guaranteed trustworthiness of any institution is a surefire way to promote hope. In this inflationary context, do we not need to trust any entity that manages our money?

If we move over to consider our spiritual lives, which involve both a relationship with God and with our neighbor, we can easily see that we need hope, which is to trust God. That trust, which on His part neither falters nor fails, demands that we do our part to reciprocate. Our major threat is from the devil. The devil you say. Hasn't he been put on the back shelf? Out of place in our technological sophistication? Ah, but never forget that his chief strategy is to convince us that he doesn't exist. Our Lord Himself had no such doubt. He referenced Satan over thirty times in the New Testament.

God knows we see the devil's handiwork all over the place. Look how well he has done with the widespread use of pornography. The ease with which pro-abortion devotees have made the murder of children in the womb into a "women's health issue."

As we read or hear about the miraculous healings Jesus performs, both among His inner circle of friends and with anyone in need, we know He can meet any need we may have of healing. Do not be lulled into doubt by the fact that these stories took place over 2,000 years ago. That kind of thinking only damages our trust. For God a thousand years are like a day. And the Bible tells us that "Jesus is the same yesterday, today and forever." If doubt starts to damage your trust, remember that the word "gospel "means "good news." That's such a matter of fact that-pardon the pun-you can "bank on it."

Saint Scholastica: February 10

Scholastica was born in 480 to wealthy parents in Nursia, central Italy. According to St. Gregory the Great, she was the sister of Saint Benedict, the founder of the Benedictine order. Catholic tradition holds that she was his twin sister, although it is unclear if she was his twin biologically or spiritually.

After her brother founded his monastery in Monte Cassino, she founded a religious community for women in Plombariola, five miles from him. This became the first Benedictine convent. Although the rule of life was set by Benedict, it was Scholastica's duty as abbess to see that the nuns kept it faithfully, cheerfully, and regarded it as the best means for their sanctification. She exemplified the motto of *ora et labora* (pray and work) and under her care the sisterhood flourished.

Since women were not allowed into the monastery, Benedict, Scholastica and their companions would meet at a guest house at Monte Cassino once a year. The siblings would pray together and discuss sacred texts and the spiritual life.

In 543, perhaps sensing that her earthly existence was drawing to a close, Scholastica begged Benedict to stay with her for the night to continue their discussions. However, he refused, not wanting to break his own Rule that monks could not stay away from the monastery overnight. So she folded her hands in prayer and immediately thunder and lightning rumbled across the sky.

"What have you done, my sister?" Benedict cried reproachfully. She simply replied, "I asked a favor of you and you refused. So I asked God and He granted my request." Unable to return because of the storm, Benedict and his companions stayed. Three days later, while in prayer, he saw a vision of a dove rising from the convent. He knew that this was Scholastica's soul ascending to heaven. He sent the monks to retrieve her body and buried her in a tomb he had prepared for himself. Benedict passed away shortly after and was buried beside his sister.

Saint Agatha: February 5

Saint Agatha is one of seven women commemorated in the Canon of the Mass. She was a young girl, possibly only 15 years old, who was tortured and martyred under Roman persecution. She is the patron saint of rape victims, breast cancer patients, and oddly—bakers.

Part of her punishment involved having her breasts amputated. In iconography she is often depicted as holding her breasts on a platter. In medieval times this was mistaken for bread. That's how the tradition of blessing bread on her feast day began. In Catania, Italy, people gather for a three day long festival held in honor of this brave saint who would not renounce her faith under great tribulation. They hold all night processions and every bakery serves a confection called *minne di Sant' Agata*. It is a dome shaped ricotta and marzipan dessert topped with a cherry, meant to evoke the associated iconography of the young saint.

Confirmation

Please note that in order to be a sponsor, you must be a registered member of a parish for at least 6 months, tithing and attending weekly mass faithfully. Please be sure you meet these requirements before accepting this great responsibility.

What is the purpose and duty of a godparent? From Catholic Answers @ catholic.com

The godparents' purpose is to help the child attain heaven. Pursuant to the law of the Church, a godparent (or *sponsor*) must, in pertinent part, "be a Catholic who has been confirmed and has already received the most holy sacrament of the Eucharist and who leads a life of faith in keeping with the function to be taken on" (Can. 874 §1.3).

The role or "function" of godparents cannot be reduced to some social award. Parents should not feel obligated to select a favorite family member or friend; rather, they ought to seek partners who will join with them in this earthly pilgrimage to help their child attain heaven. The godparents will publicly affirm their commitment to help the parents in their Christian duty to raise the child in accordance with true religion.

The duties of a godparent are simple: be holy so that you may help lead your godchild into holiness. There is a tradition that godparents will raise the child if the parents die. Whether to follow such a tradition is at the parents' discretion. What is expected by the Church is that the godparents exhibit the virtues necessary to flourish in their purpose. The godparents should live a life of holiness, in obedience to the Church. The godparent is a spiritual mentor and should be an exemplar of Catholic virtue in both word and deed. As the child matures, it will be important for him to see someone—other than his parents—who treats spiritual goods as the highest goods in this life.


