**Tenebrae**

The Tenebrae is a unique, centuries old liturgy celebrated during the three days leading up to Easter, known as the Sacred Triduum.

The word "Tenebrae" means darkness or shadows. The service is performed in near darkness, with the only light coming from the Tenebrae hearse, or large candle holder. It holds

fifteen large candles, the centermost one symbolizing Our Lord Jesus Christ.

After each psalm, a candle is extinguished, beginning with the bottom-most candle and alternating sides until only the central candle is left. After the last lesson, the central candle is removed and placed behind a curtain, signifying the burial of our Lord in the tomb. A loud noise is made, representing the convulsion of nature at the time of Christ's death and the chaos of the world without a savior. Finally, the Office comes to an abrupt end, with the clergy and the faithful leaving the Church in silence, without hymn.

While the majority of the ceremonies of the Catholic Church are joyous and celebratory, Tenebrae stands in stark contrast. It is treated as a sort of funeral service, commemorating the three days Jesus laid in the tomb. It provides the faithful with a spiritual picture of the darkness after the death of Christ before the Resurrection.

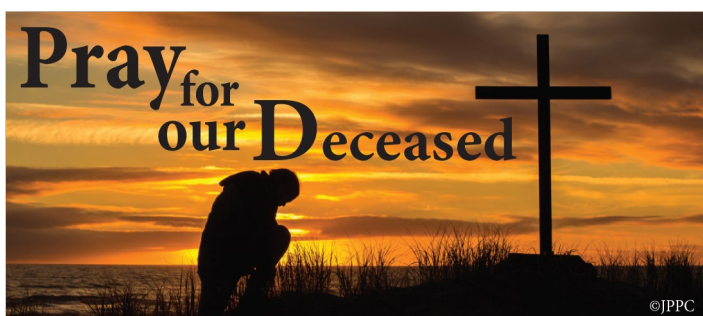

## Week of March 24, 2024 Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord

The overhead camera work used on a televised football game has something in common with an item needed for a family group photo. Both need perspective. The kind that can only come when the photographer steps back from his subject so that the viewer catches the whole scene.

I believe we can gain a better appreciation of the Lord's Passion account if we figuratively "step back" from the milieu our minds produce. Consider the many homilies we have heard over the years; the many movie versions of the events, and even the well-written New Testament commentaries we may have read, and how they influence our imaginations as we hear the words every Holy Week.

Why pull away from one or more of those? In order to gain a personal perspective of the well-known events. To be spiritually and physically alone in their presence, as if you were the only observer. Mark's version that we hear today is the major part of his shortest of the four gospels. The whole gospel can be read in less than an hour. But what matters is your reaction just to the Passion account. Various lines will pop out, so to speak, and compel you to pause for reflection.

For me, there is a line that comes early on, when Jesus addresses His disciples by saying: "The poor you will always have with you, and whenever you wish you can do good to them, but you will not always have Me." Of course He meant His physical presence, with no reference to His miraculous presence in the Holy Eucharist. Yet we can wonder what His physical presence might mean. When we hopefully reach heaven we shall be blessed with it. But in the meantime wouldn't it be consoling? I think of saints like Mary Magdalene, or Sr. Faustina, all of whom had the privilege.

Something to think about as we step back from our ordinary pondering of the words that we read or hear this week.

Meanwhile we await the message of the event on the Third Day, trusting that our decision to live as He asked us to will yield the moment when He steps forward to give us a hug of welcome to eternal joy.

God love you and give you His peace.

### Good Friday Pontifical Collection

800 years ago, the Roman Catholic Church entrusted the guardianship of the Holy Land of the Christian religion to the Holy Land Friars of the Order of St. Francis, creating what is now known as the Custody of the Holy Land. The Franciscan Monastery of the Holy Land in America is run by the Custody's friars based in America.

The Friars preserve 74 sanctuaries and shrines in the Holy Land. However, most of their work goes towards preserving God's true treasure—his people. They support 29 Catholic parishes, operate 16 grade schools, provide university scholarships, provide housing for families whose homes were destroyed in regional conflicts, and create jobs to return dignity to people in need. In a land of turmoil, they provide a sense of stability for the Christian families and needy of the region.
