Week of April 21, 2024 Fourth Sunday of Easter



During this year of Eucharistic Revival, God is calling us to draw closer to Him. One of the best ways to do this is through a Holy Hour before the Blessed Sacrament. Yes, God is with us everywhere we go. We are each a temple of the Lord, carrying Him spiritually with us in our daily lives. However, in Eucharistic Adoration God is fully present. He is with us spiritually, but also physically in the Eucharist. As Catholics we believe in the mystery of transubstantiation—that the host, once blessed, really and truly becomes the Body of Christ. So in Eucharistic Adoration Jesus is with us, body, soul and divinity. That's something truly special!

Holy Hour can be intimidating, though. What do we do for an hour? Many of us don't know enough prayers to fill that amount of time. That's okay. You don't need to fill every moment with prayers you've memorized. We don't need to be formal with God. He's our Dad. We should be comfortable enough with him to have a familiar conversation, the way we talk to our earthly parents. And that's what Holy Hour is—a conversation with God. And in a conversation we don't only talk, we also listen. So during Holy Hour there is space for silence.

There is no right or wrong way to spend time in Adoration, but here's a helpful acronym to remember if you don't know what to do: ACTS. This stands for Adoration, Contrition, Thanksgiving, and Supplication. Let's look at what each of these means, with examples of exercises you can do for each.

ADORATION

God loves you so much. And we should love Him back. We should be in awe of everything He has made and everything He has done for us.

Ask the Holy Spirit to teach you how to pray

It's okay to admit that you don't know what to do. That shows humility and that's a good thing. Ask the Holy Spirit how God wants you to approach Him, and let the Spirit guide you through this hour.

Be still

When our bodies are active, our minds can be too. Focus on sitting still and in silence. Just enjoy being in the presence of God. In the words of a devout peasant in the parish of St. John Vianney, Adoration is a time when "I look at Him and He looks at me". Let yourself be seen as you are by Our Lord.

Tell God how you feel

God already knows everything in our hearts, but He likes it when we're honest with Him and turn to Him in complete trust. Let God know if there's anything on your mind. Spend time in silence with an open heart, listening for God's voice and being open to receiving whatever message He might want to give to you.

Pray the Rosary

Mary gave us the rosary to help us focus on her Son. Praying a scriptural rosary, where we reflect on Jesus' life through each mystery, helps us to appreciate Jesus' teachings and sacrifice for us.

Read the Scriptures

Read today's passages from the Bible, or even choose one at random. Reflect on what it means and what God might want you to learn from it.

CONTRITION

To be contrite means to be sorry. We are all human and we make mistakes and sin. But God will always forgive us if we promise to be better.

Make an examination of conscience

Reflect on each of the commandments. See if there's anything you've done wrong in the past week. Sincerely promise God that you'll try to be better, and consider going to Confession as soon as you can.

THANKSGIVING

Count your blessings

Think back on your week or even your entire life. What are you thankful for? Is it your parents and siblings? Your friends? For doing well on a test? For a victory at your last soccer match? Recognize that God put these people in your life and gave you these talents. Say, "Thank you!"

SUPPLICATION

Jesus said, "Ask and it will be given to you; seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you." (Matthew 7:7) Come before God to earnestly and humbly ask for His help with whatever is on your heart.

Pray for yourself

Ask God for His help with whatever you need in your life. And don't forget to ask God what He wants too. Ask for guidance on how you can use your gifts to do His Will.

Pray for the people you know

Think of anyone in your life who might need prayers. Is your mom or dad extra tired after work? Is a friend struggling with his faith? Intercede for them. Pray to God to be with them, to give them strength, and to inspire them.

Pray for people you don't know

You know all the blessings God has given you. Many people are not so lucky. Pray for people around the world who don't have enough to eat. Pray for peace in countries where there is war. Pray for the souls in Purgatory, especially the people who don't have families to pray from them regularly.

Pray for the Church

Pray for your fellow brothers and sisters in faith. Pray that they may be strengthened in their faith, and that the Church may continue to flourish under God's loving gaze.

There are many ways to pray during Holy Hour. Choose a few examples you feel drawn to and spend a few minutes on each. It will pass by faster than you think and you will not fall asleep like Peter, James and John did in the Garden of Gethsemane. (Matthew 26:40) But if you do, that's okay too. God loves you no matter what and is happy to spend time with you.
