I'm told that 7 is the number. Not the "Lucky 7," or even the "Magic 7." Just that 7 is the age when young Junior (or Jane) reaches the "age of reason." By that our Church means that he or she knows the difference between right and wrong. What that means is that the star of a thousand smart phone photos and the official "Curator of Cute Doings" can turn less than cute at times. All of this is the natural way for human creatures to grow.

The Bible, specifically the Book of Genesis that we hear from this weekend, tells us that God's original plan did not include anything like sin. In fact, our ancestors brought it forward by their disobedience to the one command from God to stay away from just this one tree in the garden.

Century upon century ever since that wily snake that spoke would use all his know-how and trickery to keep us as trapped and imprisoned by hatred as he is. Despite being made for goodness and love, mankind succumbed to sin. Love was lost, Hatred won, Until...

Until a beautiful young girl living in a dusty little village in the Roman dominated land of Palestine said "Yes" to an angelic visitor who asked of her in God's own name to be the Mother of our Savior. That holy birth would end the reign of sin in the main, even if individuals were to keep falling for the lie. The age number her Son reached when His triumph came was 33.

Week of June 9, 2024 The Tenth Sunday in Ordinary Time



The feast of St. Anthony of Padua is celebrated on June 13. We all know that he is the finder of lost things, but did you know about the tradition of St. Anthony's bread? In this ancient practice, the faithful donate bread or alms to the poor as a petition or in thanksgiving for the intercession of this beloved saint.

One legend dates back to the year 1263, during the construction of the Basilica of St. Anthony in Padua, Italy. A young child drowned nearby. The grieving mother begged for St. Anthony's intercession, promising to donate her child's weight in grain to the poor. When the child was miraculously revived she made good on her word.

Another legend took place centuries later in 1888 France. One morning, a woman named Louise Bouffier who managed a small bakery in the seaside village of Toulon could not open the door with her key. The locksmith was called in and he too could not open the door and declared that it must be broken down. Louise prayed to St. Anthony, promising to donate some of her bread to the poor if the door could be opened without force. The pair tried the lock one more time and to their surprise it opened with ease. True to her word, Louise made sure that the poor of Toulon received their due.

The practice spread around Toulon and a few years later it was formalized when the townspeople founded a charity called "St. Anthony's Bread".

St. Anthony belonged to the Franciscan friars, an order known for their dedication to charity stemming from their love of all God's creatures, especially those most in need. He spent his life humbly serving and providing for the poor of his flock. Even though he can no longer serve with earthly hands, it is no wonder that he continues to look over his beloved charges from heaven.

Let us follow St. Anthony's holy example. This year on his feast day, consider donating non-perishable food to our food pantry or making a monetary donation to the Network of Care in his honor, especially if he has answered any of your prayers.
