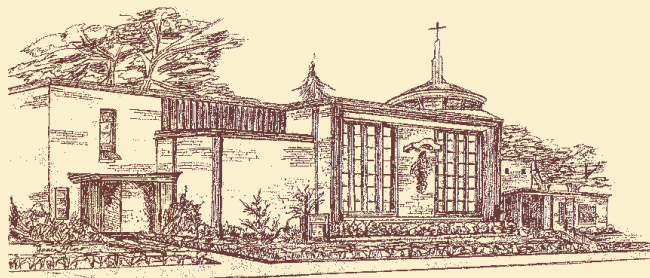

“OCD” are the initials for the “Obsessive and Compulsive Disorder. It is a genuine mental illness, one symptom of which is a need to have everything in a certain order. One of my octogenarian neighbors admits to having the problem, and my observation of her outdoor fussiness over her yard leads me to think she could be the poster person for the disorder. I have seen her sitting under a hot sun on sharp driveway stones for hours on end picking out small weeds that have the “nerve” to grow there!

This being the “World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly”, there is one virtue that I must cultivate, namely patience. We senior citizens move at a slower pace than we once did, and sometimes we bring up the rear in a march, so we need your patience.

The parable we hear from Jesus today highlights the consoling patience that the good Lord has with all of us, regardless of age. We note how the owner’s slaves are all upset that the fine planting they did has been infested with weeds. “Shall we pull them up now?” they ask. But the owner patiently responds (Was he elderly?) to let weeds and crops grow together, and at harvest time we’ll make the final separation of the two. The weeds are destined for a fiery end.

But oh how patient God is with us when we succumb to the weeds that attack our good will! Habits of sin often disguised as necessary. Clever adaptations of the Commandments that we convince ourselves as correct. All the time down deep realizing that they are “Sellouts to Satan” in the many small ways that become bigger over time. They are really deficits in our love for the Lord who loves us so much.

Consider this sad story and its happier ending all about love and patience. No one treated Lincoln with more contempt than did Edwin Stanton, who denounced Lincoln’s policies and called him a “low cunning clown.” He also told the explorer Paul Du Chaillu that he was a fool to wander about in Africa trying to capture a gorilla, when he could have found one so easily in Springfield, Illinois.

Lincoln said nothing in reply. In fact, he made Stanton his war minister because Stanton was the best man for the job. He treated him with every courtesy. The years wore on.

The night came when an assassin’s bullet struck Lincoln down in a theater. In a room off to the side where Lincoln’s body was taken, stood Stanton that night. As he looked down on the silent, rugged face of the President, Stanton said through tears: “There lies the greatest ruler of men the world has ever seen.” The patience of love had conquered in the end.

God love you, and grant you His patience.

How to Become a Baptism & Confirmation Sponsor

The role of godparent (sponsor) in a young life is a very important one. According to the Code of Canon Law, sponsors must “take care that the confirmed person behaves as a true witness of Christ and faithfully fulfills the obligations inherent in this sacrament.” Put simply, we are spiritual parents and our primary purpose is to guide our charges in faith so that they can attain heaven.

How do we do this? By being good examples of Christian faith and virtue for them to follow. After all, children learn more from how the adults in their lives live more than they do from textbooks. We can set a good example by completing our own sacramental journeys, and by being registered and practicing Catholics. This means tithing to our parish and attending Sunday mass every week. For Catholics, mass attendance is compulsory. After all, holy observation of the Sabbath is the 3rd Commandment.

If you have the honor of being asked to be a guiding light in the life of an upcoming sacramental candidate, please make sure to register with our parish. You are required to be a member with regular attendance for at least 6 months in order to be approved as a sponsor.

Saints Martha, Mary, & Lazarus July 29

The gospels of Luke and John both mention the siblings from Bethany by name. In fact, John states, “Jesus loved Martha and her sister and Lazarus.” (*John 11:5*) As an only child, it’s not hard to imagine that Jesus found joy in warm fraternization with the siblings around a fire, some light conversation over a meal, or a mellow roof-top chat as the fiery sun set over the ridge of the Mount of Olives just above them.

There are clear examples of the close bond they shared with Jesus in the three stories of them. Mary anoints Jesus with costly oils and dries his feet with her hair. Lazarus reclines at table with Jesus when he comes to share a meal with them. And Martha serves him as they dine. In fact, she’s so comfortable with him that she asks him to tell her sister to help her with the housework. Jesus gently tells her, “Martha, Martha, you are anxious and worried about many things. There is need of only one thing. Mary has chosen the better part and it will not be taken from her.” (*Luke 10: 41-42*) It is a reminder to all of us to not be distracted by worldly things, and to keep our eyes and hearts on the Lord.

However, the most well known story of the trio comes from the gospel of John, where Lazarus falls ill and dies. When Jesus arrives, he weeps for his friend. The clearly distraught sisters tell him, “If you had been here, my brother would not have died.” Jesus responds with, “I am the resurrection and the life; whoever believes in me, even if he dies will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?” To which Martha replies, “Yes, Lord. I have come to believe that you are the Messiah.” Jesus then thanks the Father and calls Lazarus out from the grave. Their true faith in him lead to a miracle and the conversion of many.

Originally, July 29th celebrated only Saint Martha, the patron saints of cooks, homemakers, and restaurant servers. However, in 2021 Pope Francis included Mary and Lazarus, with consideration to the important evangelical witness all three offered in welcoming the Lord Jesus into their home, in listening to him attentively, and in believing that He is the resurrection and the life. All three are now celebrated as the patron saints of siblings.
