will begin on Sunday at 5:00AM. The first and last hours will be open to the public. For security purposes, the doors will be locked between 10:00PM—4:00AM.



"Word Trivia," is a favorite website of mine. I suppose that the former English teacher in me surfaces now and then. At any rate, the word chosen for an early July day happened to be: "vexatious." The definition given for this adjective was "annoying and frustrating." That led me to apply the word to one of our Christian obligations of fraternal correction. You know what that is. To correct someone, usually a friend or family member, who has made a bad choice and is on the slippery slope to disaster.

We learn from the First Reading that Ezekiel the prophet, as the divinely appointed watchman over Israel, had to preach this obligation to Israel. It could not have been a popular pronouncement, there was an urgency at hand because the powerful kingdom of Babylon was breathing down Jerusalem's neck.

St. Paul echoes the call. But it the Gospel tells us of God's elaborate three step procedure for handling the matter. It starts with a caring one-on-one conversation between the parties, and if that does not work, then present it to the community of the Church. If even that fails, then dismiss the offender in his chosen pursuit. Not a happy result.

But the "good news" that this gospel conveys is that short but very sweet promise of Jesus that when 2 or 3 of us gather in His name for matters like prayer, or decision-making, or change of lifestyle, He will be in our midst.

We Catholic Christians know that Christ has all the answers we need. But His presence adds strength to our purpose. Even to the demanding task of fraternal correction, He adds His insight and power. But, as always, we have to maintain a sense of truth and unselfishness. We can never stoop to the level of a certain senior citizen I read about.

It seems this certain old man was strolling on the beach when he came upon a magic lamp. He picked it up, dusted it off, when suddenly a genie appeared. "Because you have freed me," the genie said, "I will grant you a wish."

The startled old man though for a few moments and then responded, "My brother and I had a fight some thirty years ago, and he hasn't spoken to me since. I wish that he will finally forgive me."

There was a thunderclap and the genie declared, "your wish has been granted. But then the genie continued, "You know, most people would have asked for wealth or fame. But you only wanted the love of your brother. Is that because you are dying?"

"No way!" the man answered. "But my brother is dying and he's worth about \$60 million."

September Devotion Our Lady of Sorrows



Devotions are manifestations of our profound love of God, rooted in worship and service to his Holy Name. As Catholics, it is our readiness to give honor and glory to God, whether in public or private prayer, or by performing some act of God's will, that exercises our own spirituality. Through prayer, our devotions reaffirm our total commitment to Lord. our Jesus

Christ. Since the 16th century, the Church has assigned special devotions to each month of the year based off the Liturgical Calendar.

The month of September is dedicated to Our Lady of Sorrows, celebrated on September 15. It commemorates the profound union of heart that existed between the Mother of the Redeemer and the Savior. The imagery of Mary's heart being pierced by swords comes from Simeon's prophecy at the Presentation. "Behold, this child is destined for the fall and rise of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be contradicted. And you yourself a sword will pierce so that the thoughts of many hearts may be revealed." (Luke 2:34-35) Seven swords are depicted, representing the seven sorrows Our Lady suffered.

- I. The prophecy of Simeon
- II. The flight into Egypt
- III. Loss of the Child Jesus for three days
- IV. Mary meets Jesus on His way to Calvary
- V. Crucifixion and Death of Jesus
- VI. The body of Jesus taken from the Cross VII. The burial of Jesus

In the 14th century, Our Lady of Sorrows appeared to St. Bridget of Sweden and revealed the Rosary of Seven Sorrows to her. The chaplet gained popularity in modern times following the Marian apparitions to three young girls shortly before the Rwandan genocide in 1994. Our Lady of Kibeho, as she is now known, asked the girls to reintroduce this special rosary to the world.

The Exaltation of the Holy Cross September 14

In 320AD Emperor Constantine's mother, Saint Helena, razed the temple of Venus which had been built over the tomb of Jesus. She reclaimed it in the name of Christ and erected a basilica and shrine, the Martyrium and Calvarium, in its place.

Beneath the former temple, she found three crosses. To test their veracity as a holy relic, they touched each to a dying woman. When she was immediately healed, they knew which of the three was the True Cross.

The holy site housed the Cross for veneration until 614, when the structures were destroyed and the Cross was carried off by the Persians. After 15 years, Emperor Heraclius was able to retrieve it. He intended to carry it back to Jerusalem himself. However, he was unable to carry it until he took off his imperial garb and proceeded forth barefoot.

In 1149 the crusaders built the Church of the Holy Sepulcher on the site and the feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross was added to the Liturgical calendar to commemorate its dedication. The entrance antiphon for the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross is: "We should glory in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, for he is our salvation, our life and our resurrection: through him we are saved and made free."



Saint John Chrysostom September 13

Saint John was given the title Chrysostom, meaning "goldenmouthed." This was due to his passionate and moving sermons. The Bishop of Constantinople's words were piercing and he often spoke out against hypocrisy and overindulgence within the Church. He deposed many bishops who attained their positions through bribery. His sermons emphasized the need for the wealthy to share with the poor and needy. This gained him many enemies in high places, including the archbishop of Alexandria and the Roman Empress. However, he would not be bullied and continued to be a stalwart defender of the true faith. Let us pray to this outspoken and courageous saint, that we may also stand firm and with bold confidence in the face of adversity.
