

# Week of September 24, 2023 The Twenty-Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time

You may recall reading George Orwell's social fiction novel 1984. It chronicles the life of Winston Smith, a low-ranking member of "the Party." Smith is frustrated by the omnipresent spying eyes of the party, and its ominous ruler Big Brother. "Big Brother" controls every aspect of people's lives.

The book featured something called "Newspeak." That was a purposely ambiguous and confusing language with restricted grammar and very limited vocabulary used in Oceania. Orwell states its purpose as something" "to diminish the range of thought." For example, the term "plusgood" had replaced the words "better" and "very good." Other examples include "bellyfeel", which was the blind acceptance of an idea, and "blackwhite," meaning "to accept whatever one is told, regardless of the facts."

I thought especially of all this twisted language as I reflected on the parable Jesus tells us in this weekend's passage from St. Matthew's gospel. It includes the way the landowner speaks and acts in the story, so apparently different from what most of us would say or think. You might call it "Godspeak" as the landowner asks his workers: "Am I not free to do as I wish with my own money?" Not even a hint here about an oppressive overlord kind of "Big Brother" God to contend with in decision making.


In Our Lord's parable, when landowner asks the more egopiercing question "Are you envious because I am generous?" We listeners get the point. As a follow-up, God declares the powerful truth that "my thoughts are not your thoughts." And He adds: "so high are my ways above your ways and my thoughts above your thoughts."

Our modern-day thinking might scold the landowner's failure to act according to present day labor union rules. But then we would miss the point of the parable. That is to underscore God's generosity. It's a generosity that we very much need when we go to confession. And very much in evidence when we walk up the aisle to receive His Body and Blood in Holy Communion. We will need that same generosity after we die and face His judgment in an appointment ever on our calendars.

To yield to any kind of "newspeak" or "double talk" that we might devise in order to deny these spiritual realities would be the biggest mistake we could make. Even a fatal one. We know this. But we often forget about the busyness of our lives.

We can certainly praise the Lord that we are not living in George Orwell's 1984. Instead "we live and move and have our being" in tour good Lord's 2023 Our hope is intact and fixed on eternity. Meanwhile, it's a good idea to remember this truth: "Some people use language to express thought, some to conceal thought, and others instead of thought."

God love you, and help you make your thinking more like God's.

# Week of September 24, 2023 The Twenty-Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time

### Saint Jerome September 30

Jerome was born to Christian parents in Stridon, in modern Slovenia. He was well educated and studied grammar, rhetoric and philosophy. He was fluent in Latin, Greek, Hebrew and Chaldaic. However, he did not practice a Christian lifestyle and pursued a life of pleasure, despite knowing his behavior was wrong.

To alleviate his guilt, he would often visit the crypts in Rome and imagine himself in hell. There he also developed his skills as a translator while translating inscriptions on the tombs. These visits as well as a friendship with a holy man named Bonosus led his heart back to the faith. He was baptized by Pope Liberius in 366.

Jerome traveled across Europe to study in different centers of learning, seeking out the best teachers he could find. He became renown for his intelligent and impassioned defense of Christianity against the heresies of his time. His brilliant mind even gained him a position as the private secretary to Pope Damasus.

Along with his scholarly contributions, Jerome was also known for his temper. His complete devotion to Christ also made him one the most staunch defenders of the faith. He called out foe and friend alike when he felt that they were out of step with the Church. He even butted heads with Saint Augustine, though the two eventually reconciled and Augustine said of him, "What Jerome is ignorant of, no mortal has ever known."

Desiring a life of asceticism, he became a monk, helping to build a monastery in Bethlehem. He lived in the cave that was believed to be the birthplace of Christ where he practiced strict fasting to keep himself from temptation. In his isolation, he worked on his greatest contribution to the Catholic faith: the Vulgate. He took Hebrew, Aramaic, and Greek texts and united them into the Latin translation that became the Church's official translation for the next 16 centuries.
