





Week of September 3, 2023 The Twenty-Second Sunday in Ordinary Time

The comedian Jim Gaffigan is a funny man; a family man; and the father of five. So, when he takes on Disney World as a kind of tortuous experience for both parents and grandparents, he knows of what he speaks, even if he exaggerates a little. Being the escort of five youngsters through the glorified amusement park has all the thrills of babysitting in crowded spaces.

None of that disappointment with any divine promise. Even when what God promises might be something we would never choose. Matthew's gospel presents a special moment in Jesus' life, in which He predicts His coming Passion, death and resurrection. Ever ready with an impulsive reaction, the future St. Peter blurts out a rebuke, only to be called by Jesus as "Satan." The big fisherman had yet to learn about what a divine perspective brings to everything.

Our Lord follows up on His prediction with His qualification for true discipleship: we are to willingly forfeit our own egos and plans. Then comes the real "kicker": our ultimate judgment will depend on our conduct. "Ouch!" you may be thinking.

But we gather at our weekend Eucharist as optimists. We know that our main task is always the same: to know, love and serve God. Our conduct will meet any obstacle if we just keep on trying to do this every day and rely on the Holy Eucharist and the example of the saints for perseverance.

Our American Labor Day holiday was set up not to end the summer and reopen schools, but to honor workers as part of the American organized labor movement. The repair of the I-95 collapse this past Spring was a tribute to the workers who accomplished the job in record time.

But there is a spiritual labor we can do together as

a Church to repair any collapse of society's relationship to God, as well as our own, even if both take time and patience. We believe that God has loved each of us into existence as part of His "works," His choice demands that love to be requited. We will only know for sure how well we have done so when a smiling Lord greets us at Heaven's gate.

Meanwhile, other people can mar our good works, or misinterpret them for the flimsiest of reasons. Case in point: a certain priest gave an inspiring homily at Mass one weekend morning. Afterwards, an excited teenage girl greeted Father in the vestibule, and searching for words to express her gratitude she blurted out "Father, I thought your sermon was just superfluous!"

Smiling the priest overlooked the verbal gaffe and simply replied: "Thank you, young lady. You may be interested to know that I hope to have all my homilies published posthumously."

"That would be wonderful, the teenager said. "The sooner the better."

Saint Peter Claver September 9

Known as the Apostle of Cartagena, this Spanish Jesuit left his homeland forever in 1610 on his missionary journey. Although the slave trade was condemned by Pope Paul III and later labeled "supreme villainy" by Pope Pius IX, it continued to flourish in the busy Caribbean port city. Father Claver made it his mission to administer to the slaves, declaring himself as "the slave of the Negroes forever."

As soon as slave ships entered the port, Peter would enter their infested holds to minister to the ill and exhausted passengers. And while they stood chained in yards to be gazed at by crowds, he would walk among them, bringing medicine and food. With the help of interpreters, he assured his brothers and sisters of their human dignity and God's love, baptizing those who accepted the one true God.

Saint Peter Claver administered to the least of his brethren for 40 years until sickness took him. He was canonized in 1888 and Pope Leo XII declared him the worldwide patron of missionary work among black slaves.
